Welcome to the Autumn 2021 issue of Folk in Cornwall. Publication of this issue has been deliberately delayed by a few weeks to get updated information for our listing pages. I contacted the groups and sessions listed in the magazine in September and many were still deciding if, when, and how they could resume activities.

Although almost all Government Covid restrictions have been lifted many people are still, understandably, cautious about resuming a normal life. Case rates in Cornwall have remained high through the summer and into the autumn and, after 18 months of restrictions people are uncomfortable about the prospect of resuming social indoor activities, even if they are fully vaccinated.

Tywardreath Morris are probably fairly typical. During August we ventured out on a few Wednesday evenings to dance in public, but stopped short of going inside a pub or any other venue. We also danced – outside – at our local village fete and at Cornwall Folk Festival in Wadebridge.

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In September we restarted practice nights in the village hall – which is quite a large room, has a high ceiling, and opening doors and windows. While this inside space feels OK, the majority of us would, I'm sure, be uncomfortable about going into a crowded poorly ventilated room.

From the responses I've been getting to my enquiries about re-opening it seems like a lot of groups feel the same about indoor activities. The demographic of many groups, and the folk scene in general, doesn't help as many of us could be considered vulnerable to Covid.

So while some social activities might be resuming, it still feels a long way from what was normal before 2020 and I wonder just how much the pandemic has changed social life permanently.

With a generally fully vaccinated population the question is if things

can't get back to normal now then when will they ever be able to? It seems likely that Covid is here to stay and will be the cause of some illness and some deaths every year.

Can we learn to accept that and carry on? After all, people have been catching flu – and some have been dying – every year without any suggestion of face masks, lockdowns or other restrictions. Is Covid really any different?

Folk in Cornwall has now been going for five years – although it certainly doesn't seem that long. The income from advertising, subscriptions and donations has managed to cover the costs of printing and postage, which are really the only expenses we have.

A very big thank you to all our contributors – some one-off, and some regular – who provide interesting content to fill up each issue of this magazine.

St Buryan Church Location for Concert to Launch Album

The new solo album by award-winning Cornwall-based singer/songwriter Sarah McQuaid will be launched on 15 October with a very special benefit concert in – and for – St Buryan Church, where the album and its accompanying video series were recorded and filmed.

Born out of the pandemic, The St Buryan Sessions is Sarah's sixth solo album, and is her most powerful and emotive offering yet. It had its genesis in the spring of 2020, when Sarah's gigs and tours were cancelled due to COVID-19.

Thanks to a successful crowdfunding campaign, she was able to finance a live solo recording (sans audience) in the lovely medieval church of St Buryan, not far from her home in rural West Cornwall.

"I've been living in St Buryan for 14 years now," Sarah explains, "and it's been incredibly heartwarming how my family and I have been welcomed into the life of the village. I kind of thought when we first moved here that we'd be shunned as 'blow-ins', but that hasn't been the case at all, and I'm so grateful.

"I'm also incredibly grateful to have had the opportunity to record the new album in such a gorgeous space, and I really wanted to be able to give something back."

The concert takes place on the album's release day, Friday, October 15. In order to make it accessible for all in the local community, no entrance fee will be charged, but there will be a voluntary retiring collection for church funds.

Two further Cornwall dates feature later in the six-week, 21-date tour that follows the launch: Praa Sands Community Centre on Saturday 30 October and Sterts Studio near Liskeard on Sunday 28 November.

CORNWALL FOLK FESTIVAL 2021

It was a bumpy landing for Cornwall Folk Festival in Wadebridge this August Bank Holiday. Mid-flight spring 2020, everything was grounded. A roadmap got us airborne again, but we were not the only thing soaring, so were forced in July to cancel everything indoors.

But when we finally left the plane, we were greeted by endless sun, an audience soaking up summer, and artists singing and dancing as though it were just spring. We focused on our outdoor components: 'Shanty St', codename for town centre entertainment; and the FAR (Folk, Acoustic and Roots) Stage behind Wadebridge Wines.

With five Morris sides, nine choirs and shanty groups, twenty soloists up to five-piece bands, and working with local businesses, it was a real treat to see so many enjoying live performances in the town centre. We celebrated Cornish bard Harry Glasson's songs. Our

guest of honour, he gave a most moving interview (and some great songs) with protege Will Keating.

Will later played a tight solo set and led a communal sing of 'Cornwall My Home'. Steve Winchester paired Glasson numbers with his own in a truly delicate and moving set, and The Coastal Belles peppered their collection of close harmony numbers with Glasson treats. The broad mix of quality music continued at the FAR Stage, with acts mainly from Cornwall and the South-West.

Saturday began with lovely harmony and harp from Fable, self-penned songs from Devon's Hopwood and Raven and Liam Jordan's powerful singing and song writing. The well-travelled Mandy Woods gave us well-crafted Americana, festival patron Geoff Lakeman and Rob Murch are natural entertainers, and 'Mr Folk' Steve Hunt laid out some honest-to-goodness songs.

Falmouth's My Friend John rocked the stage, and Brother Sea closed by mesmerising a packed, dancing audience. After Bath's Humm got Sunday off to an excellent start, an African breeze blew through Blowing My Own Trumpet, contrasted by Cornish shanties and humour from Bryher's Boys.

Brian Phillips, a great friend of the late Mike Walford, who ran the festival for many years, mixed his high musical standard with dry humour before joining Tim Brine and Sue Franklin for an emotional tribute to Mike. The festival shifted up-tempo when Penzance's brilliant Du Glas got people dancing, and the energetic Mother's Ruin were the perfect end to the evening.

Our final day began with female Shanty singers Figurehead's beautiful five-piece harmony. Singer/songwriter Doug Richardson's excellent self-penned songs contrasted with quality jazz from an extended Just Jazz Guitars. The audience loved duo Our Atlantic Roots so much they bought a ton of their CDs. Archie Ray and the Flutterby's soulful music went down a storm, as was Chris Ostler's tasteful, technology-expanded sound.

Peace was wonderfully disturbed by pirate punks JollyRoger, leading perfectly into a final fun ceilidh from Whippletree. We came away from three exhausting days having put a smile back on the town's face, glowing from pulling off something we thought might not happen.

We're back next year, hopefully both in-andoutdoors, with Dougie Maclean, Merry Hell, and Granny's Attic, amongst much others.



Carn Brea Morris – a Short History

Carn Brea Morris Men was formed in 1978. The group consisted of former members of Kernow Morris of Falmouth, members from 'up country' Morris sides and some with no previous experience of dancing. At that time, Carn Brea was one of only two sides in Cornwall, the other being Trigg Morris Men.

Carn Brea has always danced predominately the Cotswold style of Morris, drawing on the traditions of Adderbury, Bampton, Bledington, Bucknell, Fieldtown and Headington. We also dance more recent creations from Horsham and our own Carn Brea dances.

Carn Brea joined the Morris Ring, formally dancing in at the Southampton Ring Meeting in 1986. In 2002 Carn Brea Morris Men changed to Carn Brea Morris, left the Morris

Ring and joined the Morris Federation to become a more inclusive 'mixed' side, welcoming women to join in the fun of dancing.

In 2018 Carn Brea Morris held a very successful weekend of dance to celebrate 40 years of existence, welcoming sides from all-over the country.

Unfortunately, since the easing of Covid lockdown restrictions, Carn Brea Morris has seen a reduction in numbers and are now urgently seeking to recruit new members to ensure the survival of the side for, hopefully, the next forty years.

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Vin Garbutt autobiography

The autobiography Vin Garbutt wrote in his final years is to be published at last, four years after the folk legend's death. Vin, who was 69, passed away on June 6 2017 after undergoing heart surgery at James Cook University Hospital in Middlesbrough.

He had begun working on All the Very Best! with the help of journalist Michael McGeary

in 2014 and the first draft was completed just days before Vin died. Now, with the help and support of Vin's family, the book has been completed and will be released this autumn.

"Vin was so enthusiastic about this project," said Vin's wife, Pat. "It really appealed to him to have a record of the extraordinary experiences he had during his lifetime. He lived to walk out onto the stage and give his all to a bunch of music-loving strangers.

"His journeys from his front door to the stage door were often weird and wonderful and long – oh, so long! He travelled by public transport, a tough choice but a great way to meet people. They inspired him, cared for him and supported his career.

"Vin often vocalised that he had, 'the best job in the world' and that job took him all over the globe. It's all here from start to finish. The highs and lows of carving out a career that in the beginning could not have appeared more unlikely or hazardous.

"In his writing, I get a sense of disbelief that it all actually happened and that he achieved so much. But he did; he reached the top, and everybody loved him. He was unique, an absolute one-off and we were all so lucky to have him in our lives, whether it


was for five minutes or, like me, 48 years."

Born in South Bank, Middlesbrough, on November 20 1947, Vin became known as the funniest man on the world-wide folk scene. But while his patter was hilarious, his songs were often deadly serious, tackling issues from unemployment in the North-East to oppression and injustice wherever he saw it in the world.

He recorded 12 studio albums and three live albums and was the subject of a full-length

feature film, Teesside Troubadour. He was the first British folk artist to tour Australia and he played to packed out venues across the globe. In 2001 he was named Best Live Act at the 2001 BBC Folk Awards.

But he was also shunned by elements of the mainstream folk world because of his outspoken views. However, he refused to be silenced, even at considerable cost to his career.



Next year will see three important milestones. As well as being the fifth anniversary of Vin's death and the year he would have turned 75, it's also 50 years since he released his iconic debut album, Valley of Tees.

The book includes contributions from some of Vin's friends and admirers from the folk world, including Christy Moore, Loudon Wainwright III, Eric Bogle, Mike Harding and Jasper Carrott, as well as from fans and the people who knew Vin best.

All the Very Best! is initially being printed as a limited edition hardback with subscribers' names listed in the back. It includes many unseen photos from Vin's life. Paperback and ebook editions will follow.

GOLOWAN FESTIVAL AND BAND

Today's Golowan festival, created in 1991, brings back to life many of the traditions and practices of midsummer celebrations in Penzance, adapting them to a safe and enjoyable festival for locals and visitors alike.

Many of the familiar parts of the festival – crowds, fireworks, serpent dancing, market stalls, roaming bands, fireworks, the Mock Mayor and much more – have their roots in an ancient midsummer tradition celebrated vigorously up to the end of the 19th Century.

Until the mid 1880s, the time of midsummer, around and between the feasts of St John the Baptist (24th June) and St Peter (29th June), was vigorously celebrated in Penzance and surrounding villages. These celebrations were part of an even wider custom, for similar midsummer celebrations have been held right across Europe for centuries, forming an important – and still relevant – mark on the wheel of the year.

The earliest printed reference to Golowan can be found in a book by the antiquarian and rector of Ludgvan, William Borlase, published in 1754 – an original copy of which is held in Penzance's Morrab Library.

The book describes some of our midsummer customs: "In Cornwall, the Festival Fires, call'd Bonfires, are kindled on the Eve of St John the Baptist, and St Peter's Day, and Midsummer is thence, in the Cornish tongue, call'd Goluan, which signifies both Light, and Rejoicing."

Strictly speaking, this is made out of two words – gool – Cornish for feast, fair or festival – and Jowan – the Cornish for the name John. So Golowan means, loosely, the "Feast of St John".

The Golowan Band was created in 1991 as part of the festival revival, originally to lead processions. The Band now represents Golowan by performing at other festivals around Cornwall. The many members of the band play Cornish tunes on folk instruments.

Cadgwith Fishermen record Great Poems of the Sea

Fishermen from Cadgwith Cove have recorded a CD Great Poems of the Sea read by Fishermen of Cadgwith, Cornwall in support of the Fishermen's Mission; the great writings of the sea recorded by men who have spent their lives fishing the forbidding waters around the Lizard Peninsula.


Poems by the great poets Tennyson, Masefield, Kipling and Longfellow, together with excerpts from Melville's Moby Dick and Darwin's The Voyage of the Beagle: all read by Cadgwith covemen Steve Collins, Nigel Legge, John Trewin, Plugger Jane, Luke Stephens, Martin Ellis and Jonathan Fletcher.

'These are men more used to standing with salt in their hair and teeth on the deck of a crabber rather than standing in front of a microphone reading lines of poetry', said producer Robin Bates, 'but what you'll hear are authentic voices of men who know first-hand what the poets write about. In a way, the 21 tracks of the CD are a retort to the current fashion for recording sea shanties - often sung by singers who have never been to sea. For the men on this CD – it's a way of life.'

Local musicians provide incidental music between the readings and the CD carries four songs, all original. Two Men, written and performed by Paul Collins, tells of two Cadgwith fishermen lost in 1994 when their boat sank in Kennack Bay. The song reflects the disparity between domestic life ashore and the perils of life at sea.

The Fishermen's Mission supported the families of both fishermen through their grief and loss and is spoken of with great gratitude and respect in the Cadgwith fishing community. Profits from sales of the CD are going to support the Mission's continuing work.

The CD, presented in a booklet-style sleeve designed by Serpentine Design of Cadgwith, is currently on sale for £10 in

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

FAIRPORT CONVENTION - Fame and Glory




