Welcome to Issue 20 of Folk in Cornwall. I can't really believe that I have now been writing these editorials for five years, but I have. An awful lot has changed in that time, both for me personally and for the folk world. That we have managed to keep going for five years is in no small measure due to the many people who have contributed to and supported this magazine during that time. So many thanks to all of you for your past and continuing support.

Autumn 2021 saw a gradual and cautious re-opening of the folk scene in Cornwall as Covid restrictions were lifted. After nearly two years of social distancing, many people feel uncomfortable with the thought of being in crowded indoor spaces again. With the continuing presence of the virus, and now the emergence of the new Omicron variant, this is understandable and sensible.

However, as more time passes it is becoming clear that Covid is not going away any time soon. Someone told me the typical duration of plague in the past was five years. Whether or not that's true we are certainly going to have Continued on Page 2

Covid around for a long time if not permanently and are going to have to find ways to live with it. It is also true that the lockdowns and social distancing measures come with their own cost, both in physical and mental well-being.

That cost may be much less than caused by the virus, but it is still there. "Risk Assessment" may be a much over-used phrase, but I think we are all going to have to get used to balancing the risks from Covid against the benefits of social interaction.

I know how much better I feel, both physically and mentally, after I have been to a Morris practice, folk session,


NEWS FROM DREAMERS

Bagas Crowd have been continuing to meet in small groups in Illogan, Hayle, Truro, Par and Penryn, and thanks to some dedicated co-ordination most of these groups are set to continue even in these cold months, in village halls. Our new rehearsal space in Truro at the Malabar Centre is also busy and we have fortnightly Saturday practices booked there.

Meet me on the Corner

There is no disputing that the folk scene has been majorly disrupted by the pandemic over the past year or so. Singers have, for the best part, gone into hibernation, musos ground to a halt in their lack of inspiration for learning new stuff, morris dances reduced to solo zoom performances, and folk clubbies have been dusting off their CDs

There has been one or two resolute groups that we are aware of who have met regularly at outdoor venues and compromised between social distancing, observing Covid safety measures and doing their thing; the Scottish Country Dancing group, and Bagas Crowd, just to mention a couple.

But how do we get back into this? Singing, playing and dancing in a back garden is fine for practising and keeping the skills going, but what is really missing is perhaps the most important element - the audience.

Morris teams are out again, and getting the buzz once more of giving pleasure to those specatators who delight in the window of a promise of a return to normality. What will have to wait a little longer, in the minds of many people, is the return to the songs and music in the convivial atmosphere of the lounge bar at the local.

However, I am quite surprised that there hasn't been a noticeable increase in street musicians or buskers. Here is an opportunity to get together in a small group to bash out a few songs and tunes, and bring cheer out of the dark mood of the pandemic.

Where to start? Cornwall Council does not generally license street performers, but it does have an obligation to observe the law regarding noise, obstruction and anti-social behaviour. Performers can be asked to reduce the volume of noise (if practicable) or stop on request if the council or the police receive a complaint.

According the Cornwall Council's Guide, Street Performers, performers should...

- play at a reasonable volume. People have to work nearby and loud music at the popular busking spots can be very distracting and annoying.
- ensure noise (music and voice) is not heard beyond 20 metres nor be a nuisance to nearby premises.
- have plenty of variety in the set. Do not play the same song or beat for long periods of time.
- use amplification responsibly. Amplification is tolerated by the Council, but if abused all equipment can be confiscated.

Performers should not...

- perform at one place more than one hour and should not return for two hours. Noisy entertainers (eg. drums, bagpipes) should move on after half an hour.
- obstruct the highway, and ensure their audiences do not either. Circus acts must take great care not to put the public at risk of injury.
- perform within 50 metres of another busker and Big Issue pitches should also be observed.
- cause offence or distress to the public and are asked to show consideration to shops and to avoid obstructing goods and fire exits.
- ask for money, but can accept donations (Street Collection Permit is required if charitable donations).

Noise (music and voice) from busking is a major issue. When setting up at a pitch, ask another person (eg. another busker or a nearby workplace) to give you a sound check. Noise is not just about amplifiers – some vocalists and acoustic instruments are more penetrating. Please contact the Licensing Section on licensing@cornwall.gov.uk for further information and advice on live music exemptions.



WRECKERS BORDER MORRIS

Wreckers Border Morris dance proudly in the black and gold colours of the Kings of Dumnonia. The black and gold can be seen on the shield of the Duchy of Cornwall, with its 15 gold bezants on a sable shield which are represented by the bells on our bell pads.

We originate on the Cornish side of the Tamar Valley, and we perform traditional dances as well as new ones written by members of the side.

There are many styles of morris that have developed in different regions of the country over many years – you may be familiar with the Cotswold tradition, performed by dancers in white costumes with handkerchiefs. Our style of morris, where handkerchiefs are replaced by wooden sticks, comes from the Wales–England border, a style called Border Morris.

Our name 'Wreckers' comes from the stories of the legendary Cornish Wreckers who, it is said, would wave their lanterns on the cliffs to lure passing ships to crash on the rocky coast,

and then plunder the valuables from the subsequent wreck.

Wreckers Border Morris was founded in 2000, holding its first meetings in a local pub, of course! Many of our dances are based on local history, and include original dance figures to represent features of these stories.

For example, one of our popular dances is based on Shamrock, the last sailing barge on the river Tamar. Built in 1899, it is now permanently moored at Cotehele Quay.

Unique for its shallow draught for easy beaching, this beautiful boat inspired a dance full of nautical references, the last figure being a meandering line of dancers, representing the winding course of Shamrock on its many journeys.

The tune that accompanies the dance is a traditional Cornish tune – Delkiow Sevy (Strawberry Leaves). This is one of the oldest Cornish tunes collected, with

words dating from the 17th Century. Although we do not sing the words, the tune works perfectly with the dance. In 2018, Wreckers' nominated charity was the restoration fund for the Shamrock.

We are very proud to tell the stories of our Cornish history wherever we go. We have travelled far and wide, including Germany and the USA, demonstrating our unique and lively style. A planned trip to Estonia in 2020 was unfortunately cancelled because of Covid, but we hope to continue our travels in the future. However, you can always catch us locally in Cornwall and Devon.

The people at Wreckers are very friendly, and we are always ready to welcome new members who are willing to give morris dancing and music a try. We meet every Thursday to practice during the winter months at St Dominick Village Hall, and we dance out in the summer at a variety of events, ranging from national music festivals to local village fairs.

Every year we nominate a charity which we raise money for throughout the dancing season. So, why not come along and join us for some music, exercise and a jolly good time!



On The Record

My own career as a professional musician in the 70s was brief and inglorious. Eventually I settled for a real job, but continued (of course!) to play, and when I moved to Cornwall in 2016 I was happy to find an active folk scene and even real folk clubs. Even better, while I don't sing traditional songs myself any more, it seemed that some folkies actually liked my songs.

So when I retired in 2019, I hoped to do more playing, possibly even a few more gigs. And then, along came Covid-19. For a while there was nowhere to play but my own home office/studio. I tried recording videos and even some virtual sessions, but I wasn't comfortable with the restricted opportunities for interaction.

Even when venues slowly started to return, there was a multitude of younger, more committed musicians competing for what gigs were becoming available. Who needs a slightly rheumatic guitarist/rusty singer? So I started revisiting my studio and home-studio recordings, and exploring options for releasing/re-releasing them. I don't claim to have investigated thoroughly, but in case it's of use to some of your readers, here are my thoughts.

The easiest way I've found of releasing a single or album digitally is through Bandcamp (https://bandcamp.com). You can release a physical CD through Bandcamp too, but since I don't get out to sell CDs anymore, I haven't looked at that. Bandcamp has a free basic service. Its profit comes from taking a 10-15% cut from anything sold through the site, the rest being paid into your PayPal account.

However, you have to do all the marketing yourself and your tracks don't go to Apple Music Spotify, Amazon and so on. In general, you can't pitch your songs to these companies directly: you have to submit them via a third party like CD Baby or Distrokid. There is a Bandcamp Pro service at \$10 per month, but it isn't an exact equivalent to those services.



CD Baby takes a one-off fee upfront for each single or album release, but if you don't already have a UPC (Universal Product Code), you'll need to buy one from them, as these are used to track sales of each product. That fee gives you widespread digital distribution, but for full monetization you need to pay the pro rate, which gives you CD or vinyl distribution, sync licensing, royalty collection, song registration, and more. Distrokid charges a very moderate yearly rate (\$19.99 currently – no extra charge for an ISRC or UPC): you can submit as many singles or albums over that period as you like, and they remain with the stores as long as you keep renewing. Alternatively, you can pay a 'legacy' fee (currently \$49 for an album) for each release so that it stays up even if your subscription stops. There are pricier 'musician plus' and 'label' plans with more features.

REVIEWING THE CDs



When our editor suggested that I might like to do the CD reviews for Folk in Cornwall, I was both excited and apprehensive in equal measure. I've known JT for many years, going back to our time together in the once great 'Tattered Swan' border morris team based in Truro in the late 1980s. There were a couple of decades when I was having to work 'up country' to earn a crust and pay the mortgage, but have been back a few years now and we have renewed our morris acquaintance in Tywardreath Cotswold morris team.

It's an honour and a responsibility to do the reviews, but more than anything it's such a pleasure to listen to some absolutely wonderful new music, especially when it's come from artists that I've never heard before like Anna Tam or Jez Hellard. There have already been lots of highlights – there's one on the hi-fi now – individuals and groups who are breathing new life into old songs and tunes or using traditional idioms to influence and create vibrant new sounds.

Of course, occasionally there comes along a CD that doesn't 'float my boat' in which case I tend to diplomatically not submit a review for

it rather than describe a singer as having an annoying mid-Atlantic whine for instance. But that is rare, and there is so much great music being produced that I'd urge you to support this wonderful talent and support the artists by buying CDs or downloading their work.

For those interested in tech, I play the CDs on my Italian made Unison Research CD player which has a rare Valve based DAC (Digital Analogue Converter) through a tube technology valve pre-amp and a beast of a Lumley Reference 60/60w valve power amp and out through a pair of upgraded KEF Reference 104 speakers. The walls are soundproofed!



PALBUM OF THE SEASON


DOM PRAG - Needle and Thread

A new name for me, but I really enjoyed this CD produced by Phil Beer no less. Themes of the oppression and exploitation of communities runs throughout this album with traditional songs of evicted miners and transported poachers alongside some excellent self penned numbers. Dom's vocals are strong and his renditions are emotive but it is his original guitar style that grabbed me. Heavily classically influenced Dom brings a fresh perspective to well known songs with his playing.

BROOKS WILLIAMS and AARON CATLOW -"Ghost Owl"



US born guitarist Williams was asked by wildlife film-maker Simon Hurwitz to compose some music to accompany his films of Barn Owls. Williams quickly became inspired and found that he'd created enough music to fill a whole album and asked master fiddler Aaron Catlow to play on the recordings. Just like the Barn Owl's flight, I found myself being carried on the wings of the music as it swooped and climbed effortlessly. With elements of folk, bluegrass, jazz, ragtime and

even a bit of Indian Raga this is a very listenable CD.

HANNAH JAMES and TOBY KUHN – Sleeping Spirals

An interesting and atmospheric collaboration between Hannah and French cellist Toby Kuhn, showcasing a mixture of traditional and self-penned songs and tunes. The range of both accordion and cello are explored with passion and originality blending with Hannah's vocals to create an engaging and emotive soundscape. A certain mellow wistfulness also comes across from several of the songs and tunes that matches the sleeve photographs. Enjoyed it.


KATHRYN LOCKE with CHODOMPA MUSIC - LA

They decided to record it as if live over just three days, and the sense of joy of playing music together shines through the recording. There is a mixture of traditional and self-penned tunes all played with sensitivity, verve and great technical virtuosity. These guys are the future of folk music and deserve our support - so go out and buy or download this album.

SASKIA – Where are we heading

A very listenable to CD from Saskia whose voice I found reminiscent of Joni Mitchell in the higher registers. The self-penned songs vary from the deeply personal 'Help' and 'So divine' to commentaries on our life and times with lines like "it seems evil exists, it rules our time and nobody minds". (cf Simon Wiesenthal) The title track exhorts peaceful resistance and a change in direction for the world through our own actions. Nice one.
