We have an amazing range and diversity of, largely unspoilt, habitats - coastal area, woodlands and moorland. We have a rich and proud cultural identity and heritage, of which our folk traditions are a part.

Quality of life cannot be measured only in economic terms. In some ways it is difficult to measure at all – how can you put numbers on beauty? It's probably enough just to say that Cornwall is a special place.

Finally I'd like to give a special welcome to the many visitors and holidaymakers that will come to Cornwall this summer. If you are a visitor you may have picked this copy up in a library or tourist information centre — or you may even be reading it online through the website.

Whether you sing, play, dance or just want to watch and listen I hope that while you are here you will take the opportunity to sample the wide variety of folk, in all its forms, that takes place in Cornwall and is recorded in these pages.

I can assure you that you will be made most welcome wherever you go.

Best Album award for The Young 'Uns

The St Ives September Festival backed a winner when they booked The Young 'Uns for 2018.

The Teesside trio more than justified the Festival's faith by going on to win the Best Album prize, for their latest recording Strangers, at this year's prestigious annual BBC Radio 2 Folk Awards at Belfast Waterfront.

Victory gave the Teesside trio - David Eagle, Michael Hughes and Sean Cooney - a hat-trick of BBC Folk Awards after being named Best Group in both 2015 and 2016. This year they were also nominated for Best Original Track with Be The Man which features on their award-winning

album.

Cooney wrote nine of the ten tracks on the new album including Be The Man, the haunting story of Nazim Mahmood, who committed suicide because his family could not accept that he was gay, and Ghafoor's Bus about a Stockton-on-Tees grandfather who in 2015 converted a bus into a mobile kitchen and and set off to feed refugees across Europe.

September Festival chairman Mary English said: "Congratulations to The Young 'Uns.

We knew they were good when we booked them and the public agreed by voting for their album." The Young 'Uns will be appearing at St Ives Guildhall on Friday, September 21 - the penultimate night of the 15-day 300-event September Festival.

An impressive folk line-up at this year's Festival also includes Seth Lakeman. Fisherman's Friends. Sound of the Sirens. Hackney Colliery Band, Shackle, Daphne's Flight, Breabach, John Otway and Wild Willy Barrett and the Whitetop Mountain Band.

The Folk in Cornwall phone and email haven't been quite so busy over the past three months so there is not very much news to report.

Two sessions have closed since the last issue of the magazine.

The session at Lanlivery had only been running for a couple of months when it was told by the landlord that the pub would be too busy for the session to take place in the summer. Whether the session will start there again next winter has yet to be decided.

The monthly session at Pensilva has also closed, this time due to lack of support. It was not getting enough

people going to remain viable so if, like me, you had thought of going along but never got around to doing so it is now too late.

Penzance folk club has moved after a change of landlord at the Admiral Benbow pub where they have always met. The club is now meeting at the Bath Inn so has only moved about 400m.

Note that the existing folk club at the Bath Inn is still running and is separate from Penzance Folk Club. Both clubs meet on alternate Wednesdays so the new arrangements suit everybody.

Finally we are saddened to learn of the recent death of Gordon Burrow. Gordon was a stalwart of the folk scene in North Cornwall, particularly the Cavaliers Ceilidh Band that has provided so much enjoyment over the years.

He will be fondly remembered by many of our readers. Our sympathy goes to his family.





An evening out with . . TYWARDREATH MORRIS DANCERS

The dancers standing three and three are a most illustrious sight
If someone saw a better one then you surely know he lied
You can hear the bells a-ringing as the singer calls them on
They can dance away the night and day and never step it wrong

That verse from Richard Thompson's song Albion Sunrise is beautifully evocative of Morris dancing — although the phrase "never step it wrong" always makes me smile. I've been dancing, off and on, for more than 30 years and found that it gets "stepped wrong" quite often, although the audience might not realise that what just happened was not actually supposed to.

Anyway, the idea of this piece is to describe an evening out with the Morris and for me this means Tywardreath Morris. Having spent Wednesday evenings throughout the winter practising in the village hall come May, with the light evenings and (hopefully) good weather, it's time to take our show on the road, or more accurately, to the pub.

Pubs are the traditional venue for Morris and many landlords are welcoming, sometimes providing us with free food or drink. Our summer programme is therefore carefully planned to visit as many pubs as possible in our local area who welcome us. We arrive about 8 or 8:30 and spend about half an hour dancing outside the pub.

Ideally we like a flat level hard surface, but as this is not always available we often find we are dancing on a hill in a road, around potholes and traffic.

It would be nice, but wrong, to suggest that we put on a highly polished and choreographed performance. While it is always satisfying to put on a good show in the end, for us, it is really about the social event and



iust having a good time. The nice thing about Morris, for me, is that it is totally noncompetitive.

We don't judge or compete to see who is the best dancer. we just want everyone to enjoy themselves. We do think it is important to show this enjoyment in our performance and believe if we do so those watching will share in it and also have a good time.

While we don't really ever dance to crowds of people.

we usually find a few will come out of the pub and watch and it seems to help the performance if someone is watching.

After we have spent about half an hour dancing we move inside the pub for the rest of the evening and have what we call General Merriment. This is mix of music, singing and poetry. It's like a session, with




everyone who wants to, contributing something with the rest of us joining in as and when we appropriately can.

It continues the theme of having a good time - although I am noted for contributing miserable folk songs. Sometimes quests or visitors turn up and join in - which always makes it better. Sometimes we end up entertaining others in the pub, sometimes we end up singing and playing just to ourselves. It doesn't really matter.

I've been having these evenings out with Tywardreath Morris now for over seven years. Obviously some are better than others, but they are always enjoyable. I hope over the years at least some of the people who have watched us dance or heard us sing have also enjoyed themselves.

anyone interested in the detail Tywardreath Morris are a mixed side of men and women who perform in Cotswold style, with baldricks, bells, handkerchiefs and sticks. Some of the dances we do are traditional from the village of Adderbury and from Lichfield. Other dances are modern. composed by Broadwood Morris to a style named Horsham. We have adapted some of the dances to suit our own style, and have also made up some of our own. More details can be found on our website: www.tvwardreathmorris.org.uk



CORNISH SONGS

Here in Cornwall we have a number of songs that have firmly established themselves in the cultural heritage of the county. They reach far beyond the folk world, being sung by choirs, at rugby matches and in some pubs which have established a tradition of a Cornish Song evening - sometimes called a Shout. In fact you will be more likely to hear them in these surroundings than in the folk clubs and sessions listed in this magazine.

Probably the best known of these is Trelawny. This song was composed in 1824 by Robert Stephen Hawker, Vicar of Morwenstow, and is actually called The Song of the Western Men. Jonathan Trelawny (1650-1721) was one of seven bishops imprisoned in the Tower of London by James II in 1688. Born at Pelynt into an old Cornish family, he was a supporter of the Royalist cause during the English Civil War.

Jonathan was ordained a priest in 1676, and in 1685 was appointed Bishop of Bristol. In Cornwall, the news of the arrest of their Bishop was greeted with anger and dismay. "And shall Trelawny die?" asked the Cornish. But at this time there were no twenty thousand Cornishmen able to march on London to effect his release.

The Cornish had given so much to the Royalist cause during the Civil War that they were exhausted. On June 30th, 1688, the seven bishops were brought before the King's Bench in Westminster Hall and charged with seditious libel.



To cheers in Westminster Hall, and in the streets of London, they were acquitted. News of the acquittal produced scenes of great joy, the church bells of Pelynt were rung and the mayor fired the two town cannons.

Parson Hawker, as he was know to his parishioners, was a poet and antiquarian. He published the song anonymously, and his


name only became known after Charles Dickens acknowledged his authorship in the serial magazine Household Words.

The Harvest Festival that we know today was introduced in the parish of Morwenstow in 1843 by Hawker. He invited his parishioners to a Harvest Service as he wanted to give thanks to God for providing such plenty. This service took place on October 1st, and bread made from the first cut of corn was taken at communion.

Hawker was reputed to be something of an eccentric, both in his clothes and his habits. He loved bright colours and it seems the only black things he wore were his socks. He built a small hut, that became known as Hawker's Hut, from driftwood on the cliffs overlooking the Atlantic Ocean and spent many hours there writing his poems and letters.



This driftwood hut is now the smallest property in the National Trust portfolio. He talked to birds, invited his nine cats into church (one of which he is said to have later excommunicated for mousing on a Sunday) and kept a pig as a pet.



Camborne Hill, another song in the Cornish pantheon, is traditional and celebrates Richard Trevithick's historic steam engine ride up Camborne Hill (from Tehidy Road to Fore Street) on Christmas Eve in 1801.

On September 11th, 2001, Rick Rescorla, a chief security officer at the World Trade Center in New York, originally from Hayle and a rugby man, sang Cornish rugby songs on his megaphone to keep morale high as he was evacuating over 2,000 employees of Morgan Stanley from the WTC's Second Tower.

Survivors have said to particularly remember him singing Camborne Hill. Rescorla was last seen alive on the 10th floor shortly before it collapsed. Another adopted Cornish song, The White Rose, was sung at his funeral.

Richard Trevithick was born in 1771 at Tregajorren near Camborne. The son of a mining captain he was immersed in mining and engineering from an early age. His most significant contribution was the development of the first high-pressure steam engine. The Trevithick Society, formed over 80 years ago, has constructed a working replica of the engine that went up Camborne Hill in 1801.

A BIT OF A RIDDLE . . .

For those of you who didn't know it, a Crowdy-Crawn is a wooden hoop covered with sheepskin used as a percussion instrument in Western Cornwall at least as early as 1880; very similar to the Irish bodhran, it is said to have originated from a tool used for gathering or measuring grain.

When not in use in the field, the Crowdy-Crawn was used to store odds and ends in homes: "In old country house-keeping in West Cornwall, odd things, all worth saving, but for which no special place on the wall, shelf, chimney board, or dresser was provided, were tidied away into the "Crowdy-Crawn"; a sieve-rind with a bottom of stretched sheep-skin, serving on occasion also as a tambourine for dancers, but originally meant as a corn-measure."

It is used by some modern Cornish traditional music groups as a solo or accompaniment instrument. The name Crowdy-Crawn is derived from the Cornish "croder croghen," literally "skin sieve", sometimes shortened to "Crowd". The term is also used modernly to describe a gathering of people for Cornish cultural storytelling, lace-making, quilting, spinning and other traditional activities.

According to one authoritative observer, the Irish bodhran was derived from the "riddle", an agricultural tool used for sifting coarse material from harvested grain: "most

bodhrans were made out of sieves and riddles (for riddling corn). They just removed the wire, and used the frame."

As a "Riddle drum," the instrument is also known from Dorsetshire and Wiltshire in England. A book on English agricultural hand tools depicts a riddle with a beech frame 28in in diameter from Leicestershire, England, and Scotsman Osgood Mackenzie stated that he "never saw a wire riddle for riddling corn or meal in the old days; they were all made of stretched sheepskins with holes perforated in them by a big red-hot needle", suggesting that the instrument had similar origins all over Great Britain.

The description of the instrument is perhaps summed up best by Margaret Ann Courtney and Thomas Quiller Couch in the 1880 publication: Glossary of Words in Use in Cornwall. "Crowd, a wooden hoop covered with sheep-skin, used for taking up corn. Sometimes used as a tambourine, then called Crowdy-Crawn."

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The Rowan Tree win Liet International

On Wednesday 23rd May Cornish folk band The Rowan Tree became the first Cornish act to win Liet International XXL, and the first to represent Cornwall since Gwenno in 2003.

Described as the 'minority language Eurovision', the song festival invites entries from musicians across Europe who sing in a minority language, with the shortlisted songs going on to compete in the main competition, held in a different European city each year. Liet International XXL 2018 was held in the Friesland capital Leeuwarden with 14 rather than the usual 10 acts competing, including winners of the Frisian Liet contests and the Sami Grand Prix.

Taking part were bands singing in Frisian, Sami, Sranan Tongo, Franco-Provençal, Komi, Galician, Scots, Antwerp-Flemish, Arman/Aronmanian, Gaelic, Bashkir and of course Cornish! It was a nail biting moment as 14 judges took to the stage to give their scores, quickly followed by elation as it became clear that Cornwall, the smallest amonast the minority languages represented had won!

The Rowan Tree are no strangers to competition, winners of this years Kan Rag Kernow (Song for Cornwall), the band then went on to place 2nd at the Pan Celtic International Song Contest after a tense 1st place tie break with Ireland.

It was while at the 2017 Pan Celtic Festival members of Cornish band The Grenaways that The Rowan Tree began to emerge as a band. The four members. Tom Fosten, Richard Trethewey, Neal Jolly and Laura Garcia found they had a shared desire to play traditional Cornish music, as well as tunes and songs in a traditional style both original and from around the world.

The band's first rehearsal was on a ferry to France, and their first gig was on the Cornish Pavilion stage at Festival Interceltique in Lorient. What followed has

been a whirlwind year, with the band performing in Ireland at the Pan Celtic Festival, at Echos Et Merveille festival Toulouse, releasing their self titled and self produced debut EP, and topped off by winning Liet International

The Rowan Tree were joined at Liet International XXL by Mark Trevethan, Cornish Language Lead for Cornwall Council who took on the role of Cornish judge. The week was an opportunity to share the Cornish language with people from other minority areas, many of whom were hearing about it for the first time.

The band has also made a 7-track debut EP. It kicks off with a traditional tune, followed by "Ker Syllan" written by Cornish Grand Bard - Merv Davey, whose bardic name is "Telvnor An Wervn" meaning "Folk Harper", which really sets the scene for the rest of the album with passionate Cornish inspired songs and tunes written from each member of the Band.

For all lovers of pure Celtic Folk Music - this CD covers a whole range of tunes from dancing Troyl Reels down to the wonderful, soft laments highlighting those darker moods of misty Cornwall.
